

Prophecy Fulfillment

- ☐ The prophet was given the message but not necessarily given the understanding of how it was to be fulfilled (Hill and Walton 411, 1 Pet. 1:10-12).
- Prophecies sometimes were given in pictures and examples.
- □ "Prophetic Past" is an instance where a prophecy's verbs are in the past tense instead of the future tense. Some scholars believe this is because the events are so certain to occur that the events are recorded as if they had already occurred (Jewish Study Bible 801).

There is a belief that Isaiah was written by 2 or possibly 3 authors.				
	Proto-Isaiah: chapters 1-39 written in the 8th century BC by Isaiah, son of Amoz (Isa. 1:1).			
	<u>Deutero-Isaiah:</u> chapters 40-55 written in the 6th century BC during the Exile			
	Trito-Isaiah: chapters 56-66 after returning from the Exile			
Jesus refers to the passages throughout Isaiah as being written BY ISAIAH.				
Even if God used multiple authors, the prophecy of the "Suffering Servant" is still 500 years before Jesus!				

Behold, My servant will prosper,

He will be high and lifted up and greatly exalted.

Just as many were astonished at you, My people,

So His appearance was marred more than any man

And His form more than the sons of men.

Thus He will sprinkle many nations,

Kings will shut their mouths on account of Him;

For what had not been told them they will see,

And what they had not heard they will understand.

-Isaiah 52:13-15

The Messiah and Freedom

- YaHWeH's plan for true freedom depended upon His Servant, the Messiah.
- The Messiah would be exalted among the nations.
- ☐ He would purify the nations.
- What the Messiah would do was going to silence even kings--shock, disgust, and amazement.

-Isaiah 53:1

For He grew up before Him like a tender shoot,

And like a root out of parched ground;

He has no stately form or majesty


That we should look upon Him,

Appearance Unspectacular

- God's Messiah would appear to be nothing special. He grew up like everyone else.
- ☐ The Messiah was not physically noteworthy.
- Jesus grew up a commoner.He was a carpenter's son.
- ☐ There is no record of Jesus being a physical specimen.



He was despised and forsaken Yet we ourselves esteemed of men,

Him stricken,

A man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; Smitten of God, and afflicted.

And like one from whom men hide their face

But He was pierced through for our transgressions,

He was despised, and we did not esteem Him.

He was crushed for our iniquities;

Surely our griefs He Himself bore,

The chastening for our well-being fell upon Him,

And our sorrows He carried; -Isaiah 53:3-5

And by His scourging we are healed.

Despised and Smitten

- ☐ Jesus would have grown up being mocked because of His birth circumstances.
- ☐ The Pharisees hated and feared Jesus.
- \square The apostles forsook Jesus.
- □ The Romans beat Jesus unmercifully.
- ☐ Witnesses of the crucifixion mocked Jesus' relationship with God (Matthew 27:39-43).
- ☐ Jesus possibly felt forsaken by God (Matthew 27:46).

Our Iniquity, His Pain

- ☐ God's plan was a result of mankind's rebellion.
- Crucifixion did not begin until about 479 BC with the execution of a Persian general by the Athenians according to Herodotus in Histories.
- Israel had continually broke their part of the Old Covenant. Jesus paid for mankind's sheeplike wandering.
- Jesus did not argue or seek to defend Himself from the chastening (discipline) due for our iniquity.

His grave was assigned with wicked men,

To crush Him, putting Him to grief;

Yet He was with a rich man in His death,

If He would render Himself as a guilt offering,

Because He had done no violence,

He will see His offspring,

Nor was there any deceit in His mouth.

He will prolong His days,

But the LORD was pleased

And the good pleasure of the LORD will prosper in His hand.

-Isaiah 53:9-10

Irony in Death

- Crucifixion victims were supposed to be disposed of quickly and often haphazardly. There are some historical reports that talk of mass graves for crucifixion victims.
- ☐ Jesus was killed without someone to carry on His Name/bloodline. However, Christians bear His Name and are included in His bloodline spiritually.
- ☐ Jesus was buried in a rich man's tomb. The further irony is that Jesus' tomb was owned by a member of the group that had Jesus killed.



Matthew 27:57-61

When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who himself had also become a disciple of Jesus. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate ordered it to be given to him. And Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn out in the rock; and he rolled a large stone against the entrance of the tomb and went away. And Mary Magdalene was there, and the other Mary, sitting opposite the grave.

As a result of the anguish of His soul,

He will see it and be satisfied;

By His knowledge the Righteous One,

My Servant, will justify the many,

As He will bear their iniquities.

-Isaiah 53:11-12

Therefore, I will allot Him a portion with the great,

And He will divide the booty with the strong;

Because He poured out Himself to death,

And was numbered with the transgressors;

Yet He Himself bore the sin of many,

And interceded for the transgressors.

Obedience Leads to Blessing

- ☐ God planned to offer Jesus from the very beginning (see Gen. 3:15).
- □ Through Jesus, God offered Himself as a guilt offering to Himself on our behalf (Leviticus 6:1-7).
- Jesus has justified us through His death.
- ☐ Because of Jesus' willing obedience,God honored Him.



Philippians 2:8-11

Being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. For this reason also, God highly exalted Him, and bestowed on Him the name which is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee will bow, of those who are in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and that every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

1 John 2:1-2

My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and He Himself is the propitiation for our sins; and not for ours only, but also for those of the whole world.
